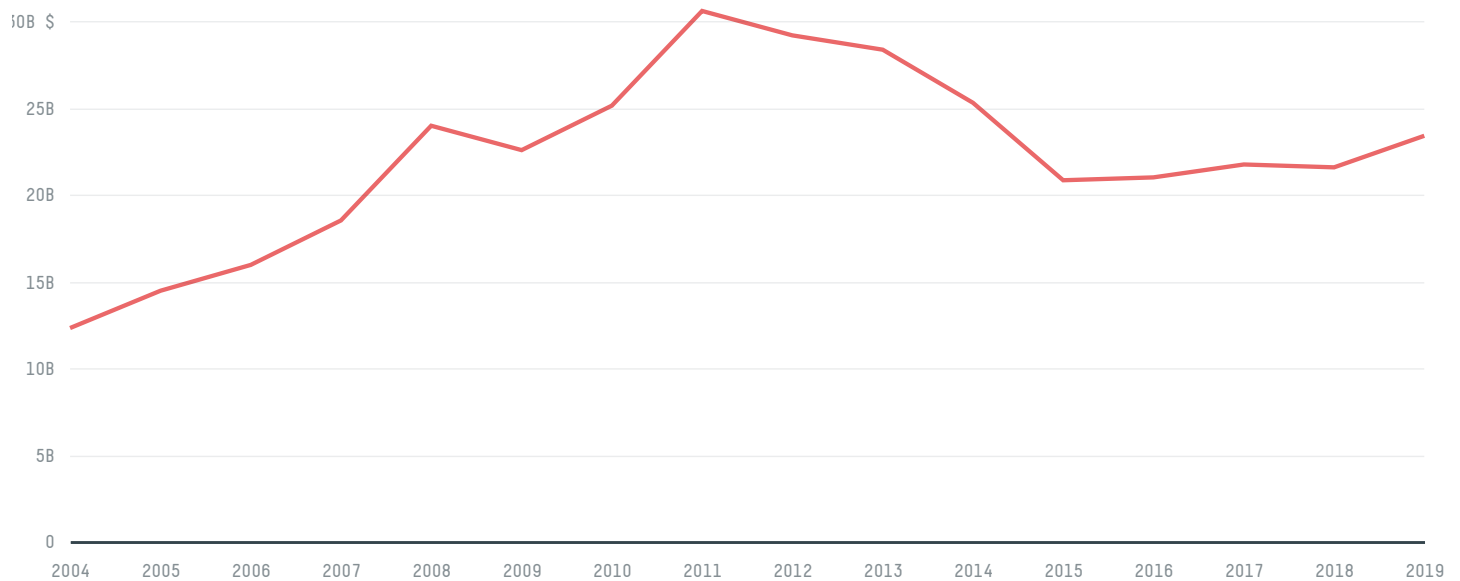

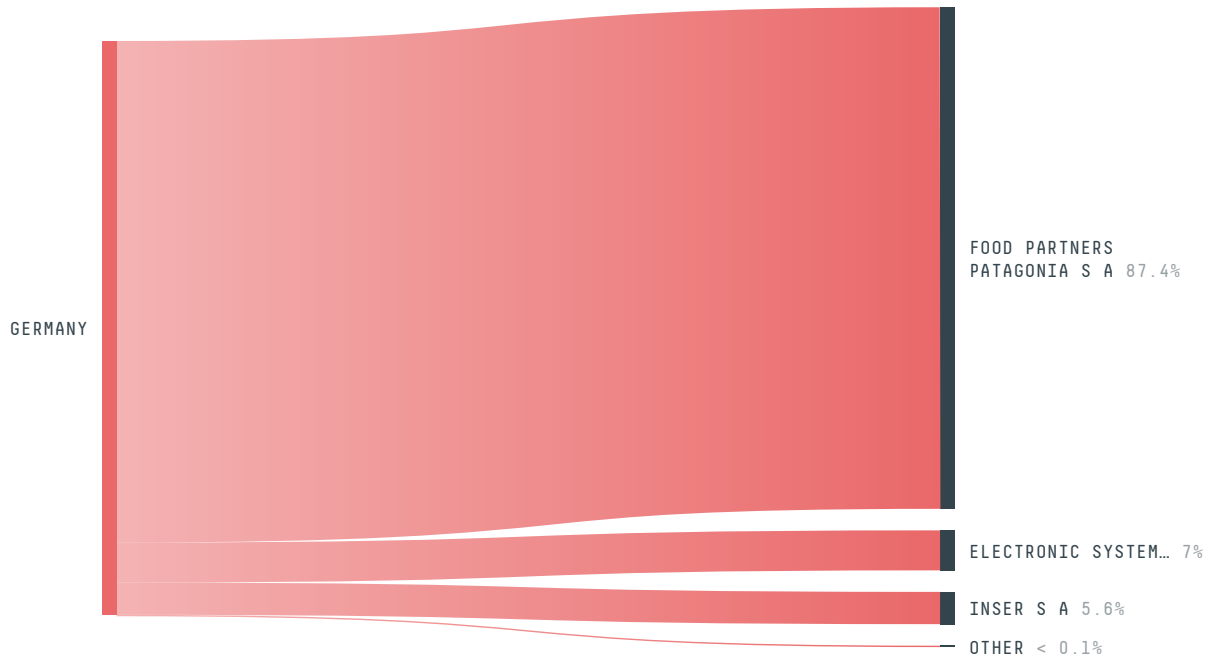

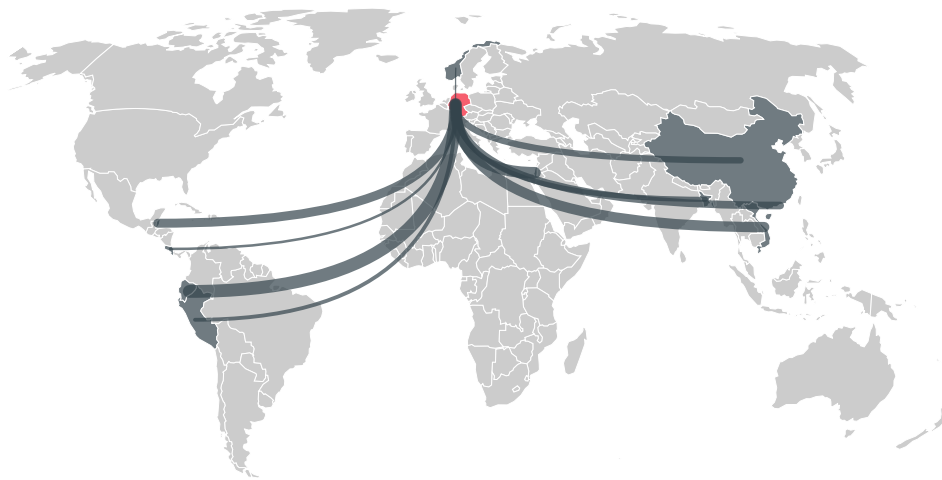
IMPORT TRAJECTORY OF GERMANY
